Principle 1: Surveillance

Eyes on the street	 The building is designed to promote passive surveillance through openings facing both Albany Highway and Shepperton Road as well as any public space Development maintains sightlines to and from the proposed development and the surrounds by ensuring signage and
Clear Sightlines	 equipment does not create a significant visual obstruction. Circulation spaces surrounding external walls are unobstructed by structures removing the opportunity for concealment and ensure free pedestrian movement with clear sightlines
Effective lighting	 Glazed portion of the ground floor is free of clutter and signage to allow for sightlines between the development and public realm. Circulation spaces are free of structures that can obstruct pedestrians
Technological surveillance	 Provided footpath on both frontages in view of adjacent land uses. Lighting provided where required to support pedestrian and user safety. CCTV provided where required.
