To ensure economic efficiency, applications will be evaluated against the extent to which they satisfy the following criteria. Responses to the Qualitative Criteria are designed to demonstrate the applicants operating capacity to deliver services to the community and to meet the requirements of the funding agreements.

The Operating Subsidy will support the operating capacity of the applicant to deliver programs and services to a specific community cohort, or the 'broad community'.

- An example of a specific community cohort would be seniors aged 55+, or people with a disability, or people experiencing or at risk of homelessness.

1) Evidenced-based Need (weighting 25%- total available marks 25)

- The need for the service you provide within the community i.e.
 - Are you addressing a service gap in the community? If so how can you demonstrate this? How is your service unique?
 - How many people (approximately) will benefit from your service?
 - Have you undertaken human centred-design and developmental evaluation (consultation and engagement with stakeholders in program design, monitoring and evaluation)
 - Is there secondary data sets to support the need for your service in the local community?
 - Is your service a duplication of a service that already exists in the community?
- How is your service value for money (it is really important to evidence efficient use of ratepayer's funds and to demonstrate industry standard bench marking).
 - Are you able to demonstrate a significant return on the ratepayer's investment in your service?
- Staff capacity and capability (experience and qualifications) to deliver services/ program in the chosen community/communities

- o provide evidence of the skill set, capabilities and capacity of staff to measure outcomes
- hot tip- do not over claim attribution (i.e do not make unsupported claims; do not take credit for an outcome when in reality the outcome may have occurred regardless of your intervention or service. Refer to the CSI-The Compass, for additional information)

3) Outcomes are relative/ proportionate to the funding amount requested (value for money) (weighting 25%- total available marks 25)
