We also have a virtual exhibition since last year - 330 extra visitors over 12 months through this. It has been very difficult to attract entries in our First Nations Artist Award category - for the last few years we haven't been able to award the prize. In 2022 we awarded the First Nations Artist prize, but there were only 3 finalists in the category.
